How the School Works

Class Organisation

For organisational purposes, schools are structured into classes. Each year it is the responsibility of the Headteacher to organise the class structure.

Currently we have three classes arranged in year groups, P.1-2, P.3-4-5 and P.6-7. In accordance with regional policy, the classes are generally arranged chronologically and children are taught in groups and individually so that all have the opportunity to realise their maximum potential according to age and ability.

Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success

To promote positive behaviour all children and staff have a shared understanding of well-being and children's rights and responsibilities. All staff model behaviour which promotes and supports the well-being of all, consequently, an environment of trust exists within the school where children know that they will be listened to, and their thoughts and opinions will be respected. Staff and children work within the framework of GIRFEC (Getting it Right for Every Child) and are familiar with the wellbeing indicators (Safe, Healthy, Active, Nurtured, Achieving, Respected, Responsible, Included). The school promotes outdoor education and physical activity to encourage both physical and mental wellbeing. Regular opportunities exist for the children to work outdoors through forest schooling. Classes organise their own positive behaviour rewards and there is also a whole school 'House Points. system' where children can gain individual points which also count towards the House Cup. Merits

are awarded for outstanding work, effort, acts of kindness etc. Throughout the session certificates for our Achievement Wall are shared and celebrated at Assemblies. Success is also shared through photographs and scanned work on display in the foyer and through Class Dojo etc. We have five key words which are our 'school values':

Respect Kindness Responsibility Inclusion Honesty

These five words enable pupils and staff to work together to create, agree and uphold our values and have high expectations for positive behaviour and attitude in the class and the playground.

Grants and Bursaries

Scottish Child Payment

The Scottish Child Payment is a payment for families on certain benefits or tax credits. Eligible families will get £40 every four weeks for each child under six.

Best Start Grant

Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods are payments that help towards the costs of being pregnant or looking after a child. Best Start Grant is made up of 3 one-off payments:

- Pregnancy and Baby Payment
- Early Learning Payment
- School Age Payment

Best Start Foods is a prepaid card that can be used in shops or online to buy healthy foods like milk or fruit. The payments you can get now will depend on:

- how far along in your pregnancy you are
- how old your child is

Clothing Grant

The award of clothing grants is to assist with the cost of school clothing for families who are on a qualifying benefit or on low income. The current award is presently £134 per primary school child and £150 per secondary school child.

School Meals

Special Dietary Requirements

Facilities Services – Catering provide special dietary requirements for food allergy and intolerances; medically prescribed diets; or diets for religious or cultural reasons specific meals for children of different ethnic origin. Free School Meals

Free school meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. Confirmation of when this will be rolled out to Primary 6 and Primary 7 from the Scottish Government has yet to be confirmed.

In Nursery eligible children can receive up to 1140 hours a year of Early Learning and Childcare. As part of this funded offer the child will be entitled to one free meal and a snack each day.

All primary schools are now operating a pre-order system for school lunches for paid and free school meals. Parent / Carer will receive a letter informing them of how to create and set up an account for their child.

Free school meals can lead to a large saving in each year, nursery and primary school pupils can save £360 and secondary school pupils can save £370. You'll also be helping your child's school if you qualify for free school meals. Some Scottish Government funding provided directly to schools is linked to the number of pupils who are entitled to free school meals.

Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child/children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. Absences are recorded in class registers and frequent or irregular absences not supported by a reasonable excuse, will be notified to parents and the matter may be referred to the Opportunities for All Service. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

Absence from School

Pupils who need to leave school during the school day ie doctor /dentist appointments, must be collected by a named contact confirmed with the school office. They must also report to the school office on their return to school.

Curriculum for Excellence

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE), now known as 'Scotland's Curriculum,' is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds in nursery, primary, secondary, at college and via workplace or community learning. It aims to respond and adapt flexibly to meet the needs of an ever changing and evolving world and Scotland's place within it. At its heart lies a constant commitment and drive towards excellence and equity, to raise standards, improve knowledge, develop skills for all learners and close the gap between the lowest and highest achievers by ensuring everyone has an equal opportunity to be successful no matter what their background or circumstances. Ultimately it aims to nurture children and young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

Broad General Education

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3. How is my child doing?

There will be several opportunities for you to discuss your child's progress. This may be through informal discussion with the teacher or at Parents' Nights/ Learning Conversations, formal reports or for some it may be through more formal, focussed meetings with other agencies.



Helping Your Child and Family Learning

The aims and purposes of setting homework are:

- to support and build on classwork
- to make parents aware of the work children are doing in school
- to encourage children to work independently
- to develop perseverance and self -discipline
- to promote good study habits
- to train pupils to plan and organise their time effectively
- to allow preparation for future classwork
- to provide information for parents
- to provide opportunities for individualised work
- to encourage pupils to take responsibility for their own learning
- to create channels for home-school dialogue

Homework is always given out with plenty of time to enable the child to complete the exercise without any pressure. It is felt that supervising homework is one of the ways in which parents can take an active part in their children's education. The type of homework set is left to individual class teachers and the time to be spent on it will probably range from about five minutes per night at the early stages, gradually increasing to a maximum of 30 minutes at the upper stages of the school.

School Improvements

- Making effective use of a range of literacy and numeracy resources. This includes using digital technologies to create and sustain effective,



engaging learning environments, as well as provide appropriate support and challenge for all children.

- The embedding of outdoor learning and forest schooling as a key teaching approach to ensure children are meaningfully and actively involved in leading their play and learning.
- Equip our children with the vital digital skills which will lead to improved educational outcomes.
- Pupils will be inspired and motivated to address the challenges of living within the environmental limits of our planet and to build a just, equitable and peaceful society.

Fully implement the Rights Respecting Schools programme in order to achieve Gold Award Status.

Health and Safety

Emergency Procedures (including Safer Together Guidance)

If your child feels ill during the school day and we feel that he/she would be better at home, we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. **Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.**

Health Care (inc First Aid)

Many children will require their health care needs to be met at sometime within the nursery/school environment, for most children this will be for short periods of time only, but for some children this may require more long-term planning and support. If your child has any health care needs, please contact the school to discuss arrangements. Full details of the support available and your role as a parent and the role of your child are contained within Health Care in Schools 3-18 (NHS and Dumfries and Galloway Council) which is available from the school.
