How the School Works

Class Organisation

For organisational purposes, schools are structured into classes. Each year it is the responsibility of the Headteacher to organise the class structure.

Over recent years, the school roll has grown significantly. There are currently 10 primary classes, 3 supported learning classes and a 70 place nursery.

Class organisation is reviewed each school session to take account of the number of pupils at each stage and class capacities.

Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success

Park School RESPECT code promotes positive behaviour in all aspects of school life; in learning, making positive choices, respecting others. Children are encouraged to work as part of a house team to earn points. Rewards are given when a house reaches a points target. These could include anything from non-uniform days to afternoon tea with the headteacher.

Children can also win gold stars for individual achievements e.g. showing resilience in learning, demonstrating kindness to others, achievements outwith school (swimming, Brownie badges) etc. Once a child receives 9 gold stars, they are able to choose a prize from the prize cabinet. Other ongoing awards include pupil of the month, kindness awards and wordmillionaire (reading award) presented at assembly to mark individual achievements within school.

Wider achievements are acknowledged through 'Proud at Park' notifications on the school app and newsletter e.g. qualifying for a football/netball team,

winning a regional/national competition, taking part in an event, etc.

Every year the school awards special prizes to celebrate individual achievement in communication, creativity, mathematics and enterprise. Prizes are also awarded for endeavour and sporting achievement. The supported learning class also presents a special award for achievement.

School uniform

School uniform helps children to feel part of the Park Team and is strongly encouraged.

The uniform consists of a navy polo shirt or white shirt and school tie if you prefer, grey or black skirt/trousers/pinafore and a red jumper or cardigan.

Sweatshirts, cardigans and polo shirts are available to purchase from school.

Items of uniform can also be purchased from supermarkets and department stores.

We also encourage parents to pass on items of uniform that still have some wear left. The school also has a uniform swap shop with FREE new and nearly new uniform items. This can be found just outside the school office.

Children are asked to bring shorts, a t-shirt and gvm shoes for PE.

Grants and Bursaries

Scottish Child Payment

The Scottish Child Payment is a payment for families on certain benefits or tax credits. Eligible families will get £40 every four weeks for each child under six.

Best Start Grant

Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods are payments that help towards the costs of being pregnant or looking after a child. Best Start Grant is made up of 3 one-off payments:

- · Pregnancy and Baby Payment
- Early Learning Payment
- School Age Payment

Best Start Foods is a prepaid card that can be used in shops or online to buy healthy foods like milk or fruit. The payments you can get now will depend on:

- · how far along in your pregnancy you are
- how old your child is

Clothing Grant

The award of clothing grants is to assist with the cost of school clothing for families who are on a qualifying benefit or on low income. The current award is presently £134 per primary school child and £150 per secondary school child.

School Meals

Special Dietary Requirements

Facilities Services - Catering provide special dietary requirements for food allergy and intolerances; medically prescribed diets; or diets for religious or cultural reasons specific meals for children of different ethnic origin. Simply ask the school for a registration form to allow us to inform the catering team who will discuss your child's requirements in full.

Free School Meals

Free school meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. Confirmation of when this will be rolled out to Primary 6 and Primary 7 from the Scottish Government has yet to be confirmed.

In Nursery eligible children can receive up to 1140 hours a year of Early Learning and Childcare. As part of this funded offer the child will be entitled to one free meal and a snack each day.

All primary schools are now operating a pre-order system for school lunches for paid and free school meals. Parent / Carer will receive a letter informing them of how to create and set up an account for their child.

Free school meals can lead to a large saving in each year, nursery and primary school pupils can save £360 and secondary school pupils can save £370. You'll also be helping your child's school if you qualify for free school meals. Some Scottish Government funding provided directly to schools is linked to the number of pupils who are entitled to free school meals.

Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child/children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. Absences are recorded in class registers and frequent or irregular absences not supported by a reasonable excuse, will be notified to parents and the matter may be referred to the Opportunities for All Service. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

Absence from School

Pupils who need to leave school during the school day ie doctor /dentist appointments, must be collected by a named contact confirmed with the school office. They must also report to the school office on their return to school.

Curriculum for Excellence

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE), now known as 'Scotland's Curriculum,' is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds in nursery, primary, secondary, at college and via workplace or community learning. It aims to respond and adapt flexibly to meet the needs of an ever changing and evolving world and Scotland's place within it. At its heart lies a constant commitment and drive towards excellence and equity, to raise standards, improve knowledge, develop skills for all learners and close the gap between the lowest and highest achievers by ensuring everyone has an equal opportunity to be successful no matter what their background or circumstances. Ultimately it aims to nurture children and young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

Broad General Education

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3.

Our curriculum has been designed and will continue to develop to take account of the skills children will need as they move through life and into the world of work. There are 8 curricular areas; literacy & modern languages, numeracy & mathematics, digital technologies, health & wellbeing, social subjects, science, technology, religious & moral education. These may be taught as discrete subjects or as part of what's called 'interdisciplinary learning' where more than one subject will be developed at a time e.g. recording the findings of a science experiment as a graph (maths and science) or writing a newspaper report from a particular point of view (literacy and social subjects).

Children will progress through carefully designed learning programmes to build knowledge about their local area and the wider world and develop key skills such as communicating, finding information, working with numbers, using digital technologies and most importantly making healthy choices.

Children will be supported in developing learning characteristics to enable them to continue to learn and adapt in our ever changing world. Learning characteristics include resilience, ownership, communication, reflection, challenge and innovation. The school seeks to promote wider achievement and participation in a number of ways.

All children from primary 5-7 are given the opportunity to learn to play a musical instrument and perform as part of the school band/orchestra. Many of our youngsters go onto play in the local Brass Band.

Like most schools we have sport teams where children can take part in local and regional leagues and competitions.

We also offer a wide range of off-site excursions, including residential experiences, as well as a selection of after school clubs.

Parental Involvement and Engagement

Every parent who has a child at our school is a member of the Parent Forum. The parent council is a group of parents who have chosen to represent the parent forum. As a member of the Parent Forum, each parent can expect to:

- Receive information about the school and its activities
- Hear about what partnership with parents means in our school
- Be invited to be involved in ways and times that suit you
- Identify issues you want the parent council to work on with the school
- Be asked your opinion by the parent council on issues relating to the school and education it provides
- · Work in partnership with staff
- Enjoy taking part in school life in whatever way possible

How is my child doing?

There will be several opportunities for you to discuss your child's progress. This may be through informal discussion with the teacher or at Parents' Nights/ Learning Conversations, formal reports or for some it may be through more formal, focussed meetings with other agencies.



Helping Your Child and Family Learning

Many parents have different views about homework. Homework can be a useful way of finding out about your child's learning and understanding your child's strengths and next steps in learning.

Taking 15 minutes each night can make a huge difference to your child's motivation. Set homework will usually include literacy tasks (reading, sounds/spelling, preparing a talk) and numeracy (practising number bonds, times tables, etc).

There are also a wide range of online programmes to support learning at home e.g. Purple Mash. Please checkand sign your child's homework diary every week. Foryounger pupils, checking daily would be helpful.

The school works closely with community learning and development to provide opportunities for parents and families to engage in learning. These include the weekly 'brew, blether and book' sessions for parents with pre-school children, family holiday programmes (activities and lunch) and supporting our parent council's family 'services and support fair'. A number of parents have been successful in gaining SVQ qualifications in early childhood development through school programmes. Advice and support is also available to help parents with literacy and numeracy skills as well as digital technologies.

School Improvements

Each year the school will publish a School Improvement Plan which outlines the key priorities for the school during the year ahead, following engagement with staff, pupils and parents. The plan indicates the expected impact of priorities on pupil learning, as well as providing brief information about the key tasks to be taken forward. Over recent years the school has seen increased attainment in literacy and numeracy. Pupil Equity Funding has enabled the school to support children through interventions to identify and address 'gaps' in learning as well as helping to make excursions and experiences more affordable for families.

In session 2023-24 we will:

- Continue to raise attainment in literacy and numeracy through embedding Dumfries and Galloway frameworks. In addition, teachers will look at ways to improve the teaching of reading and how this links closely to writing.
- Use an Inclusion 'toolkit' to consider ways we can improve our classrooms to help all learners because we recognize the way our classrooms are set up can have a big impact on children's ability to learn and focus.
- Aim to achieve our Silver Rights Respecting Schools Award, after achieving our Bronze Award in October 2023. We will now set up Pupil Groups to help identify and make positive changes in school. Looking at different ways children can help us evaluate how good our school is and make suggestions for improvements.

Health and Safety

Emergency Procedures (including Safer Together Guidance)

If your child feels ill during the school day and we feel that he/she would be better at home, we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.

Health Care (inc First Aid)

Many children will require their health care needs to be met at sometime within the nursery/school environment, for most children this will be for short periods of time only, but for some children this may require more long-term planning and support. If your child has any health care needs, please contact the school to discuss arrangements. Full details of the support available and your role as a parent and the role of your child are contained within Health Care in Schools 3-18 (NHS and Dumfries and Galloway Council) which is available from the school.
