#### **Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success**

The school reviews its 'Promoting Positive Behaviour Policy' on an ongoing basis. The primary aim of the Positive Behaviour Policy is to promote good relationships so that the full school community can work together with the common purpose of helping everyone to learn.

At St. Joseph's R.C. Primary, our general principals are:

- Pupils are expected to conduct themselves in an orderly and polite manner at all times during the school day both inside school and outside in the playground.
- Pupils should observe the instructions given to them by all staff in order to ensure their own safety and that of others in addition to ensuring care and respect for their own property and that of others.
- Pupils are expected to work diligently in class at all tasks set for them by staff members.

Each class has its own Classroom Code, which is agreed by the children and closely linked to the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child. We always strive to:

### **Scottish Child Payment**

Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family. It's a weekly payment of £25 that you can get for every child you look after who's under 16 years of age. You'll get the payment every 4 weeks if your application is successful.

#### **Best Start Grant**

Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods are payments that help towards the costs of being pregnant or looking after a child. Best Start Grant is made up of 3 one-off payments:

- Pregnancy and Baby Payment
- Early Learning Payment
- School Age Payment

Best Start Foods is a prepaid card that can be used in shops or online to buy healthy foods like milk or fruit. The payments you can get now will depend on:

- how far along in your pregnancy you are
- how old your child is

## **Clothing Grant**

The award of clothing grants is to assist with the cost of school clothing for families who are on a qualifying benefit or on low income. The current award is presently £134 per primary school child and £150 per secondary school child.

## **Special Dietary Requirements**

Facilities Services – Catering provide special dietary requirements for food allergy and intolerances; medically prescribed diets; or diets for religious or cultural reasons specific meals for children of different ethnic origin. Simply ask the school for a Special Diet Request Forms to allow us to inform the catering team who will discuss your child's requirements in full. All Children with allergens should register with the catering team as soon as they are aware that their child has an allergen or intolerance to food.

### **Free School Meals**

Free school meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. Confirmation of when this will be rolled out to Primary 6 and Primary 7 from the Scottish Government has yet to be confirmed.

In Nursery, eligible children can receive up to 1140 hours a year of Early Learning and Childcare. As part of this funded offer, the child will be entitled to one free meal and a snack each day.

Online pre-ordering of school meals is currently being rolled out to all secondary schools, information will be supplied by your school.

Free school meals can lead to a large saving in each year, nursery and primary school pupils can save £361 and secondary school pupils can save £370. You'll also be helping your child's school if you qualify for free school meals. Some Scottish Government funding provided directly to schools is linked to the number of pupils who are entitled to free school meals.

## Scottish Child Payment and Bridging Payments

The Scottish Government's Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family and, as of 14 November 2022, applications are now open for all children under the age of 16. The weekly value of this award will also increase to £25 as of this point.

## Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child/children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. Absences are recorded in class registers and frequent or irregular absences not supported by a reasonable excuse, will be notified to parents and the matter may be referred to the Opportunities for All Service. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

#### **Absence from School**

Pupils who need to leave school during the school day ie doctor /dentist appointments, must be collected by a named contact confirmed with the school office. They must also report to the school office on their return to school.

## Curriculum for Excellence

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE), now known as 'Scotland's Curriculum,' is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds in nursery, primary, secondary, at college and via workplace or community learning. It aims to respond and adapt flexibly to meet the needs of an ever changing and evolving world and Scotland's place within it. At its heart lies a constant commitment and drive towards excellence and equity, to raise standards, improve knowledge, develop skills for all learners and close the gap between the lowest and highest achievers by ensuring everyone has an equal opportunity to be successful, no matter what their background or circumstances. Ultimately, it aims to nurture children and young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

#### **Broad General Education**

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3.

CfE also includes Languages, Expressive arts, Religious and moral education, Sciences, Social studies and Technologies. The responsibility for the curriculum offer in your school sits with the Headteacher.

### **Religious Education**

Miss Lisi , P.5-7 Class Teacher, has the approval of the Roman Catholic Church to work in our school and deliver Religious Education. This approval is given to practising Roman Catholics who have undergone/are undergoing recognised and accredited training in the delivery of religious education as approved by the Roman Catholic Church.

Our Parish Priest is an occasional visitor to the school and provision is regularly made for our children and staff to attend liturgical services in St Joseph's R.C. Church. Children are prepared for the Sacraments of Reconciliation, First Holy Communion and Confirmation whilst in attendance at St Joseph's. The school celebrates of Mass on a monthly basis.

Pupils at St Joseph's R.C. Primary also study other world religions developing an awareness of and respect for the religious beliefs held by others and recognising that religion is an important expression of human experience.

Parents/carers have the right to withdraw their child from participation in the delivery of the RE curriculum. Should this be exercised the school will endeavour, within the constraints posed by staff availability, to ensure that alternative arrangements are made for their child.

Various extra-curricular activities, including a Breakfast Club and Netball Club, are offered by school staff, parent volunteers and Active Schools. Primary 7 benefit from curling tuition at the North West Castle, participate in Bikeability and experience an outdoor adventure residential experience. Swimming lessons are provided for children in Primary 4.

Every parent who has a child at our school is a member of the Parent Forum. The parent council is a group of parents who have chosen to represent the parent forum. As a member of the Parent Forum, each parent can expect to:

- Receive information about the school and its activities

- Identify issues you want the parent council to work on with the school
- Be asked your opinion by the parent council on issues relating to the school and education it provides
- Work in partnership with staff
- Enjoy taking part in school life in whatever way possible

## How is my child doing?

There will be several opportunities for you to discuss your child's progress. This may be through informal discussion with the teacher or at Parents' Nights/ Learning Conversations, formal reports or for some it may be through more formal, focussed meetings with other agencies.



## Helping Your Child and Family Learning

Homework has an important place in supporting the curriculum offered by this school and should be seen as a meaningful extension of what is done at school. With this in mind, parents/carers are asked to practise certain exercises at home e.g. colour recognition, counting, times tables, spelling etc. Parents/carers are further asked to provide material, time and opportunity for reading. In the case of our younger learners, it is particularly helpful if parents/carers can listen to and be familiar with their child's reading. If homework is causing difficulty or anxiety for a child, parents/carers should contact the class teacher in the first instance.

Please note, as a school we are reviewing homework throughout Session 2023/2024, involving pupils and parents/carers in this process.



## Support for All

### **Support for Learners**

All children receive support at school and nursery to help them learn. 'Additional support for learning' is how we describe any support that is extra or different to the help that most children receive. Most of this additional support is provided by teachers in mainstream classes, focussed on learning and support to be fully involved in school life. For the majority of children and young people this will be delivered in a mainstream classroom supported by their classroom teacher for a few this will mean some additional support alongside the classroom teacher, and for a very few this will be part-time or full-time provision in a school with a learning centre or an inclusion base.

In Session 2023/24, St. Joseph's R.C. Primary School's key priorities are as follows:

#### **Priority 2 – Engaging Parents/Carers and Families**

Pupil Equity Funding (PEF) is additional funding allocated directly to schools and targeted at reducing



the poverty-related attainment gap. PEF is allocated on the basis of free school meal registration, however headteachers can use their professional judgement to identify children who may benefit from targeted interventions and approaches. The school utilises PEF to provide targeted support for children, focusing on improvement activity in literacy, numeracy and health and wellbeing.

Universally, additional learning assistant input made available to classes across the school has supported Curriculum for Excellence Performance. In addition, specific interventions: Talking, Listening and Questioning (T.L.Q.), Closing the Literacy Gap (CtLG) and Closing the Numeracy Gap (CtNG) have been instrumental in improving attainment and achievement for identified individuals and groups of learners.

## Health and Safety

## **Emergency Procedures (including Safer Together Guidance)**

If your child feels unwell or have hurt themselves during the school day they must report this to an adult in the school. If we feel that they would be better at home we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.

## Health Care (inc First Aid)

Many children will require their health care needs to be met at sometime within the nursery/school environment, for most children this will be for short periods of time only, but for some children this may require more long-term planning and support. If your child has any health care needs, please contact the school to discuss arrangements. Full details of the support available and your role as a parent and the role of your child are contained within Health Care in Schools 3-18 (NHS and Dumfries and Galloway Council) which is available from the school.
