- Positive welcome and support for New Scots from community leaders, staff, volunteers, media and neighbours has been significant factor in successful resettlement
- Face to face engagement has been the most effective communication, with Newsletters, NewScotsDG website and social media also valued
- Regular programme of Briefings has provided this Board and other stakeholders with relevant information about all aspects of the Programme



# **Education and Employment**

#### **Key Findings**

- School registration arrangements now a smooth process
- English as a Second or Other Language classes valued highly range of providers and locations has been key
- Access to Benefits smooth process
- Employment successes especially for Ukrainians key sectors are hospitality, process work, retail, forestry, farming, construction; care; and some selfemployment



## **Health and Social Care**

#### **Key Findings**

 Challenge of supporting unplanned arrivals for Ukrainian Scheme and Asylum Seekers in the Contingency Hotel

Co-operation and support by GP Practices but challenge in capacity

Particular support required from mental health service



## **Homes and Housing**

Lead - Jan Hastie

### **Key Findings**

- Lack of social housing for Resettlement Schemes and Asylum Seeker dispersal is the highest risk item for the Board this reflects the national position
- Commitment by Common Housing Board to provide 19 houses over 3 years for Afghan Scheme being addressed by Registered Social Landlords (RSLs)
- Welcome the Home Group programme of 20 properties back into use in Upper Nithsdale
- Possible Scottish Government and RSL Modular Housing Programme to increase capacity



# Welcome Hubs, Community Orientation and Support

### **Key Findings**

- Syrian, Afghan and Ukrainian New Scots settled well into our communities

- Significant partnership working across public and third sectors

- Development of third sector commissions to ensure long term sustainability of support
