How the School Works

Class Organisation

For organisational purposes, schools are structured into classes. Each year it is the responsibility of the Headteacher to organise the class structure.

Our classes are multi-composite (maximum capacity 25). We believe that each child should learn at their own rate which is suited to their individual experience and ability. We work closely with families to ensure children are placed in the most appropriate class.

Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success

Promoting a positive ethos is at the heart of what we all do. All staff strive to promote positive and respectful behaviour throughout the school. In March 2018, we created our Relationship Policy with the contribution of stakeholders. The policy sets out clear expectations of all adults and children at Beattock Primary underpinned by UNCRC and GIRFEC principles.

We also celebrate success by rewarding 'Star of the Week' and 'Learner of the Week' certificates at our weekly assemblies. Pupil names and certificates are displayed on our Celebrating Success wall display too. We encourage children to bring in achievements/awards they have received out with school and celebrate this success at assembly.

We use a house system whereby each child is assigned to either Craigiellands, Evan or Hartfell. Pupils earn points in a variety of ways, for example, working hard, effort, kindness and so on. Points are tallied up termly and the winning house gets rewarded.

In June 2018, we proudly became the first school in Dumfries and Galloway to achieve Unicef accredited Gold Rights Respecting School status. The United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) is at the heart of all we do at Beattock Primary School. Each class creates their own charter and we ensure every Beattock Primary School pupils' rights are met here. We are proud that our pupils are global citizens who critically engage and explore global issues and actively participate and take action.

School uniform

Grants and Bursaries

Scottish Child Payment

The Scottish Child Payment is a payment for families on certain benefits or tax credits. Eligible families will get £40 every four weeks for each child under six.

Best Start Grant

Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods are payments that help towards the costs of being pregnant or looking after a child. Best Start Grant is made up of 3 one-off payments:

- Pregnancy and Baby Payment
- Early Learning Payment
- School Age Payment

Best Start Foods is a prepaid card that can be used in shops or online to buy healthy foods like milk or fruit. The payments you can get now will depend on:

- how far along in your pregnancy you are
- how old your child is

Clothing Grant

The award of clothing grants is to assist with the cost of school clothing for families who are on a qualifying benefit or on low income. The current award is presently £134 per primary school child and £150 per secondary school child.

School Meals

Special Dietary Requirements

Facilities Services – Catering provide special dietary requirements for food allergy and intolerances; medically prescribed diets; or diets for religious or cultural reasons specific meals for children of different ethnic origin. Simply ask the school for a registration form to allow us to inform the catering team who will discuss your child's requirements in full.

Free School Meals

Free school meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. Confirmation of when this will be rolled out to Primary 6 and Primary 7 from the Scottish Government has yet to be confirmed.

In Nursery eligible children can receive up to 1140 hours a year of Early Learning and Childcare. As part of this funded offer the child will be entitled to one free meal and a snack each day.

All primary schools are now operating a pre-order system for school lunches for paid and free school meals. Parent / Carer will receive a letter informing them of how to create and set up an account for their child.

Free school meals can lead to a large saving in each year, nursery and primary school pupils can save £360 and secondary school pupils can save £370. You'll also be helping your child's school if you qualify for free school meals. Some Scottish Government funding provided directly to schools is linked to the number of pupils who are entitled to free school meals.

Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child/children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. Absences are recorded in class registers and frequent or irregular absences not supported by a reasonable excuse, will be notified to parents and the matter may be referred to the Opportunities for All Service. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

Absence from School

Pupils who need to leave school during the school day ie doctor /dentist appointments, must be collected by a named contact confirmed with the school office. They must also report to the school office on their return to school.

Curriculum for Excellence

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE), now known as 'Scotland's Curriculum,' is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds in nursery, primary, secondary, at college and via workplace or community learning. It aims to respond and adapt flexibly to meet the needs of an ever changing and evolving world and Scotland's place within it. At its heart lies a constant commitment and drive towards excellence and equity, to raise standards, improve knowledge, develop skills for all learners and close the gap between the lowest and highest achievers by ensuring everyone has an equal opportunity to be successful no matter what their background or circumstances. Ultimately it aims to nurture children and young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

Broad General Education

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3.

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Curriculum for Excellence (CfE) is embedded across Scotland for all 3-18 year olds –wherever they learn. The aim of CfE is to raise attainment and close the attainment gap. CfE balances the importance of knowledge and skills and enables professionals to teach subjects creatively, work together and share best practice through eight curricular areas:

- Mathematics
- Languages
- Health and Wellbeing
- Social Studies
- Sciences
- Technologies
- Expressive Arts
- Religious and Moral Education

The curriculum of course, extends beyond the classroom. We look to enhance and embed what the children learn through wider experiences and opportunities. Throughout their time at Beattock Primary pupils will have the opportunity to participate in a wide range of educational visits and residential experiences. They will also have the opportunity to take part in a range of extra-curricular activities and take on leadership roles through our pupil committees. These committees include: Eco Schools, Rights Respecting Schools, Fairtrade and Charities and the Pupil Council.

Every parent who has a child at our school is a member of the Parent Forum. The parent council is a group of parents who have chosen to represent the parent forum. As a member of the Parent Forum, each parent can expect to:

- Receive information about the school and its activities

- Identify issues you want the parent council to work on with the school
- Be asked your opinion by the parent council on issues relating to the school and education it provides
- Work in partnership with staff

How is my child doing?

There will be several opportunities for you to discuss your child's progress. This may be through informal discussion with the teacher or at Parents' Nights/ Learning Conversations, formal reports or for some it may be through more formal, focussed meetings with other agencies.



Helping Your Child and Family Learning

Parents have a crucial role to play for homework to be effective. Our Homework Policy is intended to assist parents in helping their child to complete homework tasks. The amount and nature of homework set will vary from stage to stage, and child to child. For example, pupils who are in receipt of learning support may require continual revision of key facts on a daily basis. The amount of homework set will also vary depending upon the area of study currently undertaken; challenges the child might be experiencing, or indeed a disruption to 'normal' classroom routines (excursions, sports events). Homework is used to help a child share what they are learning in school with parents/carers. It helps the child to consolidate new skills, to become more secure in their learning and develop attitudes and responsibilities towards their learning. We use reading records/homework diaries to communicate with home the purpose of the homework. If at any time homework is becoming problematic and you/ your child are becoming stressed about the task then a meeting with the class teacher is recommended so that the difficulties can be rectified and productive homework can begin again.

These improvement priorities are influenced not only by the feedback and information we receive from our pupils, parents/carers and other stakeholders, but also by national improvement priorities. These priorities are then incorporated into our School Improvement Plan. This plan outlines our key priorities and indicates the expected impact of these priorities on our young people. This then forms the basis for our work throughout the year and is published on our school website. Progress and evidence towards the targets set out in the School Improvement Plan are shared through our annual Standards and Quality Report. This provides a comprehensive summary of the school's progress in addressing its key priorities and learner's achievements over the last academic year.

Health and Safety

Emergency Procedures (including Safer Together Guidance)

If your child feels ill during the school day and we feel that he/she would be better at home, we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. **Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.**

Health Care (inc First Aid)

Many children will require their health care needs to be met at sometime within the nursery/school environment, for most children this will be for short periods of time only, but for some children this may require more long-term planning and support. If your child has any health care needs, please contact the school to discuss arrangements. Full details of the support available and your role as a parent and the role of your child are contained within Health Care in Schools 3-18 (NHS and Dumfries and Galloway Council) which is available from the school.
