2.0 STRATEGIC ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT (SEA)

3.0 SEA Screening Report

The Council's determinations regarding the likely significance of effects on the environment of Protection of Water Margins Supplementary Guidance are set out in Table 1:

No	The 'Supplementary Guidance – Protection of Water Margins' only seeks to provide additional guidance to LDP policy NE12. It does not set out a framework for projects or other activities. The guidance aims to protect water margins from development. This will limit the development that can take place around water margins and protect the riparian zone.
1 (b) Will the PPS influence other plans, programmes and strategies (including those in the hierarchy) and to what degree?	No	Water margins will be protected by policy NE12 of the Dumfries and Galloway LDP. The SG provides guidance on the implementation of policies within the LDP and does not seek to directly influence other programmes and strategies.
1 (c) Is the PPS relevant to the integration of environmental considerations, in particular with a view to promoting sustainable development?	No	The PPS will enable sustainable development through protecting water margins. This will likely have a protective (neutral) effect rather than a positive one.
1 (d) What are the environmental problems that are relevant to the PPS?	No	There are several environmental problems related to the PPS. These include flooding, erosion and biodiversity. The SG can contribute to controlling flooding and erosion, whilst also providing a habitat for plants and animals.
1 (e) Will the PPS be relevant to the implementation of Community Legislation on the environment? (e.g., PPS linked to waste management or water protection)	No	The PPS is relevant to directives including the Water Framework Directive and the Directive on the Assessment and Management of Flood Risks.
2 (a) Will the environmental effects be significant when consideration is given to their probability, duration, frequency and reversibility?	No	The SG will have a protective (neutral) effect on the environment. By definition a neutral effect can't be significant.
2 (b) Will the environmental effects be cumulative in nature?	No	The environmental effects will be protective and cumulative.

(i.e., environmental effects on other Local Authorities or EU Member states)	No	Water bodies and their margins are trans-boundary in nature. Therefore any environmental effects, especially those in relation to flooding and erosion, will also be trans-boundary in nature. However these effects will be protective (neutral) for other local authorities.
2 (d) Will the environmental effects be significant when consideration is given to the potential risks to human health? (e.g., contribution to medical conditions or the possibility of accidents)	No	The SG will not create risks to human health.

(e.g. geographical area and size of population likely to be affected)	No	The SG has the potential to affect all of the Dumfries and Galloway Council area. However as the effects are neutral they cannot be significant.

OR iii) Intensive land use?	No	The SG does not specifically relate to vulnerable areas, areas of special natural or cultural heritage, environmental quality standards or intensive land uses.
2 (g) Will the PPS have a significant environmental effect on areas or landscapes which have a recognised national, Community or international protection status?	No	The SG will have a protective (neutral) effect on areas with recognised national, community or international protection status. Therefore the environmental effect will not be significant.

Summary of Environmental Effects

The purpose of 'Supplementary Guidance – Protection of Water Margins is to provide more detailed guidance on policy NE12 of the Local Development Plan and to make sure that policy NE12 is accurately interpreted. This additional guidance focuses on maintaining buffer zones around water bodies which is likely to have a protective (neutral) effect on the environment. In addition to this policy NE12 of the Dumfries and Galloway Local Development Plan, which the SG is informing, has been subject to an SEA as part as of the Local Development Plan's SEA. Therefore it is considered that the principles of the SG have also been fully assessed.

Thank you for consulting Historic Scotland on the screening report for Dumfries and Galloway Council's Protection of Water Margins Supplementary Guidance received by the Scottish Government's SEA Gateway on 19 August 2014. I have reviewed the screening report on behalf of Historic Scotland in its role as a Consultation Authority under the above Act, in accordance with the requirements of Section 9(3). In doing so I have used the criteria set out in Schedule 2 for determining the likely significance of the effects on the environment. Please note that our view is based on our main area of interest for the historic environment.

My understanding is that this guidance aims to add detail and advice to Policy NE12 of the emerging Dumfries and Galloway Local Development Plan (LDP) which deals with protection of water margins. As this policy has been subject to assessment through the SEA of the LDP I note that the council considers that the guidance is unlikely to have significant effects. In light this and the information contained within the screening report I agree that the guidance in itself is unlikely to have significant effects on the historic environment.

Thank you for your Screening Report consultation which SEPA received via the Scottish Government SEA Gateway on 22 August 2014.

In accordance with Section 9(3) of the Environmental Assessment (Scotland) Act 2005 we have considered your screening report using the criteria set out in Schedule 2 for determining the likely significance of effects on the environment. Having reviewed the Screening Report, we consider that in respect of our main areas of interest (air, water, soil, human health, material assets (of which we have a specific interest in waste) and climatic factors) the Dumfries and Galloway Council - Supplementary Guidance (SG): Protection of Water Margins is unlikely to have significant environmental effects. Although we are of the view that significant environmental effects are not likely, it is for the Dumfries and Galloway Council as Responsible Authority to make a formal determination taking into account the consultation responses received.

We understand that the purpose of 'Supplementary Guidance – Protection of Water Bodies' is to provide more detailed guidance on policy NE12 of the Local Development Plan (LDP) and to make sure that policy NE12 is accurately interpreted. We agree that as the LDP has been subject to a full strategic environmental assessment, the principles of this SG have also been fully assessed and it is therefore unlikely that additional significant environmental effects would arise.

If it is formally determined that SEA *is* required, you will be aware that the next stage requires the Responsible Authority to consult the Consultation Authorities on the proposed scope and level of detail to be included within the Environmental Report. This can be undertaken through preparation of a concise Scoping Report. We would encourage you to use the scoping process to focus the assessment on those SEA issues upon which there are likely to be significant environmental effects, to outline the baseline information you consider as most relevant and explain your proposed method of assessment. To assist with this process we have produced Standing Advice for Responsible Authorities on Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) Scoping Consultations, which is available from www.sepa.org.uk/planning.



We are committed to providing early and focused advice and supporting continuous engagement and would therefore welcome the opportunity to meet with you and discuss these issues prior to the formal consultation.
