Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success

All At Gretna Primary we are an inclusive school, with children's rights being embedded in our ethos and culture. We are committed to providing a happy, safe, welcoming, nurturing, calm and purposeful school environment in which:

Every member of the school community has the right to feel safe, valued, respected and treated fairly.

We strive to ensure that everyone in our school community is equipped with the skills and knowledge to learn effectively, build positive relationships, enabling them to grow in confidence, responsibility, achieve success and effectively contribute to ensuring that we can achieve the highest standards possible.

House Captains

We have four 'Houses' at Gretna: Baird, Bell, Bruce and Burns

From entering our school all children are assigned to a house, with Primary 7 pupils being voted in as House Captains and Vice House Captains. The House Captains promote our school values through organising fun activities such as quizzes and themed days, as well as announcing the winning houses every week in assembly. The weekly winning house receive stickers as well as at the end of each term, the House Captains organise an additional games playtime for the winning house/houses.

Pupils can be given house points by adults for, for example, working hard, displaying good manners, empathising with and helping their peers etc.

We also have a variety of general certificates as well as our school values certificates which are given out and celebrated during assemblies.

Promoting Positive Behaviour – Whole School Policy

We have recently updated our whole school policy (December 2023) for supporting positive behaviour across our school. All parents, staff and children inputted into this and our new updated approaches were launched in January 2024. This policy is available to provide you with more detail upon request.

Assemblies

We celebrate pupil achievements as well as our school values in our weekly school assemblies. As part of our assembly programme we build in time for reflection at least 6 times per year. This reflection time is linked to our assembly theme and provides the opportunity for the children to quietly reflect upon the areas being discussed. Should you not wish your child to take part in this please let your child's class teacher or the school office know and alternative suitable arrangements can be made.

Rights Respecting School

We are committed to promoting and supporting equality and good relationships. We know everyone in our school is entitled to three basic rights:

- The right to learn
- The right to be treated with respect
- The right to be safe

Our approach to managing behaviour is based on developing our children's understanding of these rights and their role and responsibility in ensuring these rights are maintained for all members of our school community.

School uniform

All Dumfries and Galloway schools have a dress code which encourages pupils to dress in a way appropriate to attendance at school. For more information on School Uniform, Dress Code, and School Clothing Grants visit <u>www.dumgal.gov.uk</u>

This code must not lead to direct or indirect discrimination on the grounds of race, religion, gender, disability or poverty. It is the expectation of Education and Learning Directorate that parents will be supportive of the dress code. Clothing which is unacceptable in school under any circumstances would include items which:

- Could potentially encourage factions (e.g. football colours).
- Could cause offence (e.g. anti-religious or political slogans).

- Could cause health and safety difficulties (loose-fitting clothing, dangling earrings)
- Are of flammable materials which may be a danger in certain classes.
- Could cause damage to floors.
- Carry advertising, (such as alcohol or tobacco)
- Could be used to inflict damage on other pupils.

Parents in receipt of a clothing grant for from the Authority will be encouraged to purchase items which are in accordance with the school dress code.

Grants and Bursaries

Scottish Child Payment

Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family. It's a weekly payment of £25 that you can get for every child you look after who's under 16 years of age. You'll get the payment every 4 weeks if your application is successful.

Best Start Grant

Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods are payments that help towards the costs of being pregnant or looking after a child. Best Start Grant is made up of 3 one-off payments:

- Pregnancy and Baby Payment
- Early Learning Payment
- School Age Payment

Best Start Foods is a prepaid card that can be used in shops or online to buy healthy foods like milk or fruit. The payments you can get now will depend on:

- how far along in your pregnancy you are
- how old your child is

Clothing Grant

The award of clothing grants is to assist with the cost of school clothing for families who are on a qualifying benefit or on low income. The current award is presently £134 per primary school child and £150 per secondary school child.

School Meals

Special Dietary Requirements

Facilities Services – Catering provide special dietary requirements for food allergy and intolerances; medically prescribed diets; or diets for religious or cultural reasons specific meals for children of different ethnic origin. Simply ask the school for a Special Diet Request Forms to allow us to inform the catering team who will discuss your child's requirements in full. All Children with allergens should register with the catering team as soon as they are aware that their child has an allergen or intolerance to food.

Free School Meals

Free school meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. Confirmation of when this will be rolled out to Primary 6 and Primary 7 from the Scottish Government has yet to be confirmed.

In Nursery, eligible children can receive up to 1140 hours a year of Early Learning and Childcare. As part of this funded offer, the child will be entitled to one free meal and a snack each day. Online pre-ordering of school meals is currently being rolled out to all secondary schools, information will be supplied by your school.

Free school meals can lead to a large saving in each year, nursery and primary school pupils can save £361 and secondary school pupils can save £370. You'll also be helping your child's school if you qualify for free school meals. Some Scottish Government funding provided directly to schools is linked to the number of pupils who are entitled to free school meals.

Scottish Child Payment and Bridging Payments

The Scottish Government's Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family and, as of 14 November 2022, applications are now open for all children under the age of 16. The weekly value of this award will also increase to £25 as of this point.

Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child/children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. Absences are recorded in class registers and frequent or irregular absences not supported by a reasonable excuse, will be notified to parents and the matter may be referred to the Opportunities for All Service. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

Absence from School

Pupils who need to leave school during the school day ie doctor /dentist appointments, must be collected by a named contact confirmed with the school office. They must also report to the school office on their return to school.

Curriculum for Excellence

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE), now known as 'Scotland's Curriculum,' is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds in nursery, primary, secondary, at college and via workplace or community learning. It aims to respond and adapt flexibly to meet the needs of an ever changing and evolving world and Scotland's place within it. At its heart lies a constant commitment and drive towards excellence and equity, to raise standards, improve knowledge, develop skills for all learners and close the gap between the lowest and highest achievers by ensuring everyone has an equal opportunity to be successful, no matter what their background or circumstances. Ultimately, it aims to nurture children and young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

Broad General Education

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3.

At Gretna Primary we deliver core programmes for:

- Literacy (Reading, Writing, Listening & Talking and Modern Languages)
- Numeracy & Maths
- Health & Wellbeing
- Technologies (ICT, Food, Textiles and Design)
- Expressive Arts (Art, Music, Dance & Drama)
- Social Studies
- Science
- RME

When planning the delivery of the curriculum, class teachers will contextualise subjects into a interdisciplinary approach. This enables children to see the connection between learning and apply skills in different contexts. Where relevant, we work with our partners and local community to provide opportunities for children to learn from real life contexts.

How is my child doing?

There will be several opportunities for you to discuss your child's progress. This may be through informal discussion with the teacher or at Parents' Nights/ Learning Conversations, formal reports or for some it may be through more formal, focussed meetings with other agencies.

Helping Your Child and Family Learning

At Gretna, each class teacher produces a termly newsletter which outlines class homework guidance. We produce numeracy and literacy helpful hints guidance for further information. We believe it's quality that matters, not quantity - the kind of homework your child does is often more important than the amount. Even if you have little time, or don't know much about the subject or level your child is studying, you can still be involved. It's not your time or ability, but a positive and encouraging attitude to your child's learning that really matters.

Homework is for children to do, not for parents. How we learn is as unique as our fingerprint, so every child might well approach homework differently, as a result of this we work closely with parents to decide if adaptations need to be made to the class homework to meet the needs of children.

We also make parents aware that homework is not compulsory, and you have the right not to undertake tasks set with your child, we would ask that you notify the class teacher of this request.

Support for All

Support for Learners

All children receive support at school and nursery to help them learn. 'Additional support for learning' is how we describe any support that is extra or different to the help that most children receive. Most of this additional support is provided by teachers in mainstream classes, focussed on learning and support to be fully involved in school life. For the majority of children and young people this will be delivered in a mainstream classroom supported by their classroom teacher for a few this will mean some additional support alongside the classroom teacher, and for a very few this will be part-time or full-time provision in a school with a learning centre or an inclusion base.

Health and Safety

Emergency Procedures (including Safer Together Guidance)

If your child feels unwell or have hurt themselves during the school day they must report this to an adult in the school. If we feel that they would be better at home we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.

Health Care (inc First Aid)

Many children will require their health care needs to be met at sometime within the nursery/school environment, for most children this will be for short periods of time only, but for some children this may require more long-term planning and support. If your child has any health care needs, please contact the school to discuss arrangements. Full details of the support available and your role as a parent and the role of your child are contained within Health Care in Schools 3-18 (NHS and Dumfries and Galloway Council) which is available from the school.
