
### **Current Class organisation**

# **Holywood Rights Respecting Code:**

Always treat others the way you want to be treated – with fairness, respect and good manners.

Be inclusive – share and be friendly.

Talk out a problem – often a problem shared is a problem halved.

Look after school property and other people's belongings.

Walk around inside school safely – run outside in the playground.

Keep Holywood tidy – recycle your rubbish!

Work hard and have fun learning at Holywood Primary School.

#### Rewards

Each class will decide together on a reward system. It could be cubes in a tube or a reward time clock. Cubes and minutes would be awarded and when a total is reached the class could choose how to spend their reward time.

Minutes or cubes can be awarded for good conduct in the dinner hall, corridors and the playground.

Alternatively we may put a big reward clock in the hall for playground points so that when the target time is reached the whole school spend a reward time together.

We will encourage rewards such as team games or group activities so that rewards are spent building the school team.

#### Consequences

When a pupil chooses to misbehave and not respect others, they have chosen consequences.

Pupils will be made familiar with the consequences and we will aim to deal consistently with pupils who make poor choices. We will also work with the pupil to support them to make better choices.

Consequences are in place to give pupils a space to reflect and make changes. They allow other pupils the right to play and work safely.

#### Playground

Step one – Verbal warning Step two - 5 minute reflection time on the bench Step three – Send in to sit at the office for reflection time Step four – choose to miss next break, sit in at the office Step five – Asked to remove themselves from playground and letter/ phone call to parents – plan structured to support changes and positive choices.

Pupils will step up the consequences for continuing minor behaviours when they have been asked to stop.

Pupils will jump up the steps for poor choices such as hitting, fighting or back chatting staff.

#### Classroom

Step one – verbal warning

Step two – time out chair in class, or Take a Minute (stand outside the door and count to 60).

Step three – 5 minutes time out to reflect in another class.

Step four – support class, 24hrs (or a shorter time may be arranged by the class teacher). The class teacher will provide suitable work. Parents will be informed by phone call or letter and will be invited into school to discuss the situation.

Naturally we hope never to use our consequence steps but it is better to be organised and have a consistent approach in place to support the pupils in making better choices.

Any serious breaches of discipline may set in motion an exclusion procedure in accordance with the regulations set down by the Education Authority.

### **School Uniform/Dress Policy**

Clothes for P.E. Shorts, socks and T-shirt / Warm clothes for outside activities Trainers

#### For everyday wear: Indoor gym shoes - No slippers or crocs.

#### Football strips are not allowed

Please note pre-loved stand available in school where items can be bought for  $\pounds 1$ . Please donate uniform items if no longer needed.

#### Jackets and Coats

These should be left in the cloakrooms and not taken to classrooms. Hats, scarves and gloves should be put in bags and **not** worn in corridors or classrooms.

#### Wet days

Pupils should have suitable clothing and footwear as we are normally outside even on wet days.

#### **Personal Appearance**

Make up (including nail varnish and temporary tattoos) are not allowed in school.

The only jewellery allowed is small stud earrings which must be removed for P.E. for safety reasons.

A watch may be worn but it is the responsibility of the child and must be removed before any P.E. activities.

Long hair should be worn up during the school day – this is for Health and Safety reasons.

#### The Curriculum at Holywood:



We offer a broad general education using creative and active approaches.

**Big Thursday:** Pupils come in their old clothes(long sleeves and long trousers) and bring their PE kit on a Thursday – art, music, computer science, STEM, outdoor skills, PE and drama are all Big Thursday subjects rotated throughout the school year.

**Week in the Woods:** the whole school takes to the woodlands every day for a week in June. Pupils transfer and apply their outdoor learning skills. They undertake new learning and work collaboratively in the outdoors. The school has a section of local woodland that we have the permission of the landowner to take responsibility for.

**Family Camp Over**: On the Thursday evening of Week in the Woods we invite families to join us for a camp over in the school playground. We usually have team games / activity, a sausage sizzle and a toasted marshmallow before we head off for a night's sleep under canvas. A hearty breakfast sets everyone up for the day ahead.

**School Show:** Pupils are keen to take on a show near Christmas usually with a Panto type theme. All pupils take on a role in the show and work together to make the performance unforgettable.

**Waterslide Day:** On the last day of summer term we have a waterslide morning. Pupils arrive in swimsuits and t-shirts and take to the soapy hills for slipping and sliding fun. One of our favourite days at Holywood!

**Bike Breakfast**: 2/3 times a year we head off on an early morning cycle and then stop into school for breakfast. Parents and family members help out by marshalling and eating sausage on rolls.

**Business Groups:** Pupils are placed in a business group and take responsibility for leading an aspect of school improvement. This session groups have included a Self-Evaluation Group, Playground Maintenance, Job Group, Fundraising Group, Charity Group and more...

# Homework/Family Leaning

#### Why have homework?

Parental Involvement an essential partnership between home and school.

# Everyone at Holywood Primary has a role to play to ensure that pupils get the most from homework.

The pupil's role will be to:

- take homework pack and share with parents /carers
- make time to do the homework
- ensure homework is of a high quality in content and presentation
- hand in completed homework on time.

The parent's role will be to:

- help children find a suitable place and time to complete tasks
- support children with tasks and to join in games / activities
- contact the school with any concerns

The teacher's role will be to:

- set homework which is skills based and clearly supports in class learning
- set homework which allows for choice in activity and timings
- ensure pupils are confident about undertaking the homework tasks
- take account of other pressures and responsibilities pupils might have
- set realistic deadlines
- check on homework and give feedback
- give recognition for effort and skills transfer

#### How can parents/ carers help?

Everyday activities can also be a source of learning. These obviously will vary according to the age of the child but could include the following:

#### Find out about their day

What did you learn today? Every time you ask what they have learned at school and listen to what they say, you help them to communicate better.

#### Share everyday activities

Involve them in planning a family event, journey or holiday. Encourage them to show you how to use the internet! Read together. Use the football results or a trip to the shops to discuss numbers and words.

#### Talk about what is in the papers or on the TV or radio

Ask them what they know and chat about their views. Help them to develop their ideas.

# There are a number of things you could try to help your child learn more about a topic or theme.

- Suggest they make up a quiz and get you to ask them the questions.
- Make up some questions to ask them.
- Suggest they talk to a friend and discuss the homework topic.
- Suggest they draw a diagram or picture illustrating the main points of what they are learning.
- Encourage them to explain what they have learned to someone else in the family.
- Suggest they pretend they were teaching the rest of their class about the topic.

#### What form does homework take?

Curriculum for Excellence asks us to make learning meaningful by linking learning and transferring skills into real life contexts. We will therefore


employ active strategies or games which we hope the children will find fun and which will allow family members to become more involved in their children's learning.

#### Handing in Homework

#### Sharing Learning with Pupils and Parents/Carers

Interim Report - a brief report usually sent home in November / December updating parents on the levels, effort and progress of their child.	Progress Report - reporting on the next steps for leaners in all curricular arear. Please note that all full reports are uploaded to SEEMIS. Secondary pupils can then access P7 reports.
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Context Planner

The planner contains the main focus knowledge, skill and activities which pupils will engage with during the project (also know as topic, theme or context!).

The colours will be based on the main curricular areas being undertaken from Curricullum for Excellence (CfE). This will change with the context. For example a history topic may focus on Social Studies, language and Religious and Moral Education while a theme about the body may focus on Health and Wellbeing, Science and Maths

Working across subjects is called Interdisciplinary Learning.

Contexts will vary in length some may last six weeks while others only two weeks.

#### Context Evaluation

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When a context has been completed pupils will feedback on the learning and teaching experiences. They will share learning or further questions for future learning. Diagrams, photographs and examples of work could be included. Pupils will then be given their own copy on which they will comment on their learning and skills development and their next steps for development before a copy is sent home to share and discuss with parents.

#### **Target Setting Meetings**

Pupils bring their parents for as discussion about learning goals and how best to support at home. Parents can help their child to decide upon a personal Health and Wellbeing target which may be impacted on at home and school.

These meetings are in the evening after school.

Target Setting takes place in October, February and June.

Pupils refer too their targets on a daily basis to move their learning forward.

#### Thinking and Talking About My Learning Folder

Pupils keep a copy of their target sheets and their context evaluations in their learning folder.

Pupils file their writing assessments, reading assessments and maths assessment sheets in their learning folder.

Pupils can choose to place good pieces of work into their folder as evidence of learning. Pupils share their folder with parents.



#### Celebrating Wider Achievements

Curriculum for Excellence requires us to support pupils in making links between the learning they undertake within school and out with school. We encourage all pupils to share new activities or success they have achieved out of school—from baking a cake to learning karate.

The most successful method we have found for pupils to share their wider achievements if trough assembly. The giant calendar is on display in the corridor and all pupils can sign up. School assembly takes place on a Thursday at 9AM.



#### Celebrations of Learning

Please note teaching staff are available for meetings throughout the school session to discuss your child's progress.

At least once a year a whole school Celebration of Learning will take place. This is an opportunity for pupils to display work / aspects of learning to share with parents and family. A celebration may be based on all or some of the eight areas of the curriculum.

Calendar – updated by e-mail regularly.

Newsletter – An information flyer which updates on school / class events reminds of dates for the diary, reports on learning and celebrates success.

Texts – Brief messages used as a reminder service or for instant messages.

Informal Meetings: staff may catch up with you at the end of a school day to update on your child's progress or behaviour.

Phone Calls – The Staff in school may wish to make instant and timely updates and prefer to telephone parents.

Parent Workshop – A variety of parent workshops are held to support pupil learning these include Getting Ready to Read and Mental Maths.

Information can be e-mailed out or posted to parents who live away from their child.

The school is happy to work with parents to find an approach which works for them and their child.
