**Dear Parent/Carer** 

In October 2022, a team of inspectors from Education Scotland and the Care Inspectorate visited Whithorn School and Nursery Class. During our visit, we talked to parents/carers and children and worked closely with the headteacher and staff.

The inspection team found the following strengths in the school's work.

- Positive relationships across the nursery, school and the wider community. This supports children to learn and play well together in a caring culture.
- Within the nursery and at the primary stages there is a strong team approach to improving
  outcomes for children. The committed teachers, practitioners and learning assistants work
  well together in their teams, and all embrace opportunities for professional learning. The
  headteacher works well with the staff team and colleagues across The Machars to
  support improvement for all learners.
- Children across the school are making good progress in literacy and numeracy. They are keen, diligent learners who tackle all tasks and activities positively.

The following areas for improvement were identified and discussed with the headteacher and a representative from Dumfries and Galloway Council.

- To support children's progress across the nursery and primary stages, continue to develop shared approaches across all stages.
- Continue to improve approaches to learning, teaching and assessment to ensure all children enjoy consistently high quality experiences. Build on current practice to offer children increased opportunities to be creative and independent in their learning.
- Review and refresh the curriculum to offer children a wider range of relevant learning experiences in the classrooms and outdoors.





We gathered evidence to enable us to evaluate the school's work using four quality indicators from <u>How good is our school?</u> (4<sup>th</sup> edition) and <u>How good is our early learning and childcare?</u>. Quality indicators help schools, local authorities and inspectors to judge what is working well and what needs to be improved. Following the inspection of each school, the Scottish Government gathers details of our evaluations to keep track of how well Scottish schools are doing.
